**From Doug Gerber on his experience at his first big international event**

Coming into this event, I felt more than ready. Back in Adelaide I was training as I would normally running programs training sections as I would coming into competing preparation - there was no pressure to win, no pressure to grab any scores (of course I wanted the worlds score and so did Richard but it wasn't our priority since this is my first big international event, but we both know I am more than capable of getting it).

We got into Colorado about 2 days before so I had enough time to adjust to the altitude, time zone etc. All of that was fine, but in the lead up for my short program - internally without really noticing, I wasn't focused on my training - I was looking around noticing so many different things such as "omg so many people are gonna be up on those stands" "look! Richard, there's Junhwa Cha". I wasn't exactly mind on the game at this point which was leading me to making errors I don't normally make. I was making myself inconsistent and leaving me with no confidence in myself. Not only this but I wanted the Worlds score and I kept on telling myself I have to get it even though this wasn't the goal from the event, but I know that if I get it - I

would feel like I achieved something from going to this event. But stressing myself out, not focusing automatically lead to me making mistakes in the short program.

Going into the Free Program I was angry with myself for making errors in the short program that I don't normally make, but I was determined to show people I was more than capable of doing basic triples and not messing up little things in the spins and steps. The practice was great, I was feeling more myself and I was in the zone. Coming into the free skate for the comp I was a little nervous because I had so many "what ifs" going through my brain and I was losing a little bit of focus, I managed to pull myself together a little bit and had a better free skate - still nothing close to what I am capable of doing but in this program it was less mental but more physical because of the altitude, it started to hit me half way through the program which is where I was more focused on my stamina and breathing, more than the actual jump technique which is where errors were made.

Putting all of this behind me, I definitely have learned a lot from this experience. I now feel as though I know what I'm doing in a way I learned a lot more about myself and what I need to do to put myself in the correct head space.

Living with the New Zealand team at this event has been so much fun, I got to learn more about my team mates that I don't get to see very often which was nice.

A massive thank you to Isabella for all the help she gave me at this competition she was on top of it, she knew all the times of where I had to be, what time I need to go eat breakfast, what time I needed to be at the rink, what bus to take etc - any questions I had she was asking people for me, when I needed a massage, if I needed to be taped up, if I need to see the physio she organised the times for me.

### **ISU Junior World Figure Skating Championships, Calgary, Canada, 27 February - 5 March**

This was Dwayne third ever international competition and by far the biggest event he has taken part in. At the ISU Championships, for the Mens and Women's divisions, skaters need to place in the top 24 in the Short Program to be able to progress on to the FreeSkate. This year saw a particularly strong field as member federations are also competing to earn placed at the Youth Olympics. Dwyane's 26<sup>th</sup> placing is even more impressive given the level of competition at this particular event. While Dwayne did not place highly enough to progress on to the Free, congratulations are definitely in order.

The following is from Dwayne Li

Junior Worlds was quite the experience for me. For the past two months training for me has been going smoothly. There was no pressure of ranking for me - I was there to experience the atmosphere, although deep down I wanted to qualify for the Youth Olympics in 2024.

Bess and I arrived in Calgary with plenty of time before the first practice session. My initial thought after getting on the shuttle bus to the hotel was the absurd amount of snow. Everywhere was covered in white, which stayed that way for the whole time when we were there. For the first couple of days we walked around the downtown area, and got to try some amazing cuisine.

Before the short program, practice has been going extremely well. I was able to get used to the 5 star ice quality there, and I was able to train with some skaters with a lot of international experience, such as Chen Yudong (I actually got to know him pretty well). With all the huge quads and triple axels being attempted around me, I stayed in my zone, focused on my own training, and tried to adapt to the competition environment as much as possible. On the first few days I was still somewhat not used to the environment because of the constant travels we have done that month, and because of the slight altitude and muscle pain. However with some help from the physiotherapy team there, I was able to perform much better.

I headed into the competition with a clear mind. Learning from past experiences I put my worries away and focused on enjoying the moment. Despite some mistakes, I was able to not crack under pressure and complete the rest of my short program without major errors. I was pretty happy with how I dealt with this

unexpected blunder. I was pretty certain that I would qualify for the freeskate, however I was met with a selection of very talented and well trained skaters, so I missed the free skate by a tiny margin.

I was able to watch the rest of the skaters compete in the free skate. It was very exciting to see them train and perform.

This competition definitely had many ups and downs. I have made new friends, experienced what a major international competition feels like, and gained a lot of experience. I really look forward to being able to compete at such a big event again.

Finally, I would like to thank NZIFSA for the ongoing support for our skating careers as well as all the support from everyone else. Thank you NZIFSA's efficient communication with the Junior World organizing committee for hotel rooms, transportations and small details when we were there. I would also like to express my appreciations to Bess, Gordon and Harrison for helping me prepare for ISU championships.

## OCEANIA INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION AND COACHES SEMINAR, AUCKLAND 15-19 MAY 2023

We are very pleased to be able to confirm that the ISU Development Commission have confirmed their support of this competition and the associated coaches seminar that we are co-hosting with our Australian neighbours.

The announcement is now available, and we will be contacting eligible NZIFSA skaters regarding their entries to this competition. Thank you all for your expressions of interest in taking part in this competition. Skater registration forms will be sent to International A and B team skaters.

The competition will be followed by a coach development seminar 18 & 19 May. We are very excited to announce that **Lorenzo Magri** is the Coach Moderator for this seminar. We will have more details about the coach development seminar very soon including the registration form.

We will be inviting some skaters taking part in the competition to be demonstrators for the coaches development seminar. Unfortunately it is unlikely that we will be able to include all those that are interested. We are working through the structure of the seminar with Lorenzo at present and that will determine how many demonstrators at which level, will be required.

## INTERCLUB COMPETITIONS

Skaters who have not been selected to the International A or B Team are able to take part in Interclub competitions in other countries. NZIFSA are currently working with Ice Skating Australia to get confirmation of which competitions will be announced as Interclub competitions. We expect to have this information for you very soon.

### **Singles Basic Novice to Senior camp, Auckland (Botany), 7-10 April**

We are incredibly pleased to have secured Peter Johansson as the international moderator, after Murphy had to withdraw from being the moderator for this event.



Peter Johansson is a former competitive figure skater. He is a four-time Swedish National Champion (1986 – 1990), He competed at five European Championships, four World Figure Skating Championships and competed in the 1988 Winter Olympic Games in Calgary, Canada. He currently lives and coaches in the US. He has coached many top-level skaters with US National medallists, skaters who have medalled at Junior and Senior Grand Prix events and World Champions, including 2007 World Junior Champion, Stephen Carriere. He was one of the coaches at the recent USFSA Advanced Novice Skater Development camp, held in conjunction with Four Continents Championships, that NZ skaters Dwayne Li, Cara Tang and Jazz Evangelou participated in.

We anticipate the camp will start early afternoon on Friday 7 April and will finish around 7:30pm on Monday 10 April. Participants from outside Auckland should plan to stay in Auckland on the Monday night.

## **NZIFSA MEMBER FORUMS AT THE AGM**

The following two Member Forums were planned for prior to the AGM.

- 1) How do we foster meaningful consultation? A lack of engagement and concerns that responses are not taken into consideration are concerns that have been raised in member forums and meetings with club representatives.
- 2) Member Protection. How do we promote positive behaviour and values at a personal and organisation level to ensure that members can take part free from harassment, discrimination, abuse and other harmful behaviours?

We ended up focussing all of our attention on how we can foster meaningful consultation and did not get to the Member Protection topic. The suggestions as to how we might improve our consultation and communication with the various stakeholder groups and on various topics have all been collated and we will be working through how best we can action them. We will have more information on this in the near future. We will also pick up the Member Protection conversation.
